We have supported 937 people with information, advice and advocacy in the year.

That is 44 more people than last year, and it seems to keep going up every year.

What is a Safe Place?




A Safe Place is where people can go if they are being bullied, harassed, become ill or get lost.

Witness Support, Preparation, and Profiling Service



The service gives support for victims and witnesses of crime with learning disabilities.



April 2024 - March 2025

Last year we worked with 39 people with 73 referrals.



Often there is more than 1 referral for the same person.



For example: 1 person may have been a victim of an assault and a theft. That would be 2 referrals.



Out of those 73 referrals, 39 referrals were completed resulting in:

- 20 "guilty" verdicts/pleas
- 2 "not guilty" verdicts
- 1 resulted in a Community
 Resolution
- 13 resulted in no action/dismissed
- 3 for Keeping Safe work/advice




Most of our money comes from BCP Council and NHS Dorset.






£21,949 was given to us to by Dorset Police Crime Commissioner and £28,000 from BCP Council to pay for this service.


Access to Work is from the Department of Work and Pension.






We got money delivering learning disability and autism awareness training. We also deliver bespoke training to other organisations.






We got money for going to Engagement Forum meetings. These meetings help Dorset Healthcare with co-production.


We are working with BCP Council Community Safety Team to expand Safe Places.

That is £107,956 more than last year.






Our biggest cost is the staff. We now employ 26 staff.




Our premises are now run by BCP Council.






We spent this on having insurance (including van insurance), paying payroll fees and things like our work mobile phones.



Van




Any vehicle goes down in value over time. That is called 'depreciation'. We have lost £7,020 on depreciation of the van and computers.


